# **RESEARCH FACILITIES**

- Three primary kinds of research facilities
  - Libraries
    - Collection of books
    - Other resources
  - Records Offices
    - Collection of records
      - Usually current or recent
  - Archives
    - Collection of records
      - Usually of an older more historic nature
- Two primary types of Facilities
  - Private
    - Part of an institution or organization
      - Funded by operation fees and donations
      - Fee or membership may be required
  - Public
    - Part of a government entity
      - Usually paid by tax payer funding
      - Generally open to the public at little or no cost
  - Rare Combination
    - Private collection in a Public facility
- Levels of jurisdiction
  - Local
    - City or County
    - Township or Borough
  - State
  - National or Federal

- Library system
  - Library classification systems
    - Dewey Decimal
      - Elementary schools
      - Public libraries
    - Library of Congress
      - Academic institutions
      - Research or resource libraries
  - Dewey Decimal
    - Begins with a number
      - Genealogy = 920
      - American History = 973
  - Library of Congress
    - Begins with a letter
      - E = United States History
      - F = Regional / Local History
- Records office
  - Purpose / Intent of record
    - Records still current
    - Not research friendly
  - A perceived loosely formal system
    - A system none-the-less
    - Basically common sense organization
  - Organized by record type or court type
    - Possibly by Department type
    - Usually in chronological order
    - Indexing possible
- Archives
  - Possibly more formal system
  - Somewhat two systems concurrently
    - Organized by Jurisdiction
    - Organized by record type or court type
      - Basically common sense organization
      - Extension of local city / county record keeping
    - State and Federal records organization
    - Generally by record type

#### **INTERNET**

**USGenWeb** -- http://www.usgenweb.com is a site of links to information and networking, organized by the states and counties in the United States. This is where you can find information as to what records are available by state or county, who to contact, what organizations exist, history and sometimes records for states, counties and possibly cities.

**Cyndi's List** -- http://www.cyndislist.com A website that attempts to organize and categorize all genealogy websites by subject, etc. So for example, when you go to her main page scroll down to "Software & Computers" and click to pull up a list of links on genealogy software and other computer related web sites of primary interest to genealogists. Here you can also find extensive links to Italian or Irish genealogy web sites, or learn about Adoption services and records, etc.

**Family Search** -- http://www.familysearch.org is one of the greatest genealogy web sites as it is the famous Mormon Church's extensive database of over 1 billion indexed records, with births or marriages, from the 1500s to the 1920s. A great place to start doing research. Includes various databases, research tips, resources, downloaded genealogies, etc., as well as online catalog of the Family History Library in Salt Lake, and a wiki of how to and records and facilities.

**Rootsweb** -- http://www.rootsweb.com is another fantastic web site which not only offers general genealogy information, research tips, etc., but also has some databases to search and links to many other specific subject web sites. There are several databases including the downloaded genealogy databases; plus links to mailing lists and message boards and how to connect or access archives of previous postings; also links to many genealogy websites that are hosted for free by Rootsweb.

**Digital Public Library of America** -- http://dp.la brings together the riches of America's libraries, archives, and museums, and makes them freely available to the world.

**United States National Archives** -- http://www.archives.gov home page for the National Archives and Records Administration of the United States Government. Click on the link to the pages for Genealogists/Family Historians. Provides a wealth of information for Genealogists on types of records, availability, databases, lessons, links, etc.

**WorldCat** – http://www.worldcat.org world's largest network of library content and services. WorldCat libraries are dedicated to providing access to their resources on the Web, where most people start their search for information. Find what you want in a library near you with.

National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections (NUCMC) -- http://www.loc.gov/coll/nucmc national-level program based at the Library of Congress that seeks to promote free access to the documentary heritage of the United States. It does this by providing cataloging for archives and historical societies around the country that do not have access to national online databases. Begun in 1959 and published bound volumes of cataloging records until 1993. As of 1986, the cataloging records were input into RLIN, the Research Libraries Information Network, an international online database. As of September 2007, all cataloging records in RLIN have been migrated into the OCLC database (WorldCat). All cataloging has since been directly input into OCLC. It is not related to the NUC Pre-1956 volumes.

**Library of Congress** – https://www.loc.gov The Library of Congress is the research library that officially serves the United States Congress, but which is the *de facto* national library of the United States. The oldest federal cultural institution in the U.S. The Library is housed in three buildings on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., and also maintains the Packard Campus, Culpeper, Virginia, housing the National Audio-Visual Conservation Center. It is the second largest library by collection size, with the largest being the British Library. The Library's "collections are universal, not limited by subject, format, or national boundary, and include research materials from all parts of the world and in more than 450 languages. Two-thirds of the books it acquires each year are in languages other than English."
